## BRITAIN

### Swansea University

ASC106 - Victims and Victimology

This module studies the historical development of the concept of 'victim' and its specific definitions for the criminal justice system and wider society, and explores the recent development of victim focused policies, laws and initiatives. Relevant criminological theories and the perspectives of victims will also be discussed

## IRELAND

### Trinity College Dublin

LA3458 Evidence

This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to the law of evidence in Ireland with particular emphasis on criminal evidence and procedure. Topics covered include: proof and probability; the examination of witnesses; expert evidence; unlawfully obtained evidence; and legal professional privilege. The influence of the Constitution and the European Convention on Human Rights in shaping the law of evidence is a theme running through the course.

CRM 2006 - Crime and the Media

The module is divided into two sections: 'Crime in the News' and 'Fictional Crimes'. The former includes discussion of the representation of politically-motivated violence (particularly in relation to Northern Ireland and the Israel-Palestine conflict), news stories of sexual violence (again, with an emphasis on research about Northern Ireland), and moral panics. The latter section will look at how the internet as well as explicitly fictional representations of crime can impact on crime, perceptions of crime and criminal justice processes. This part of the course explores themes of lawlessness, allocation of blame for crime, and the impact of screen violence.

## **SOUTH AFRICA**

PBL3801W Criminal Law

Introduction: The course covers the general principles of criminal law. Students are introduced to these principles by a brief examination of the nature of criminal law and punishment, the principle of legality and the operation of the Bill of Rights on the rules of criminal law. A brief overview of the general principles places each of the elements of criminal liability in context and demonstrates its role in deciding criminal liability.

Students will have a solid knowledge of the basic principles of international criminal law; a solid understanding of the principles underlying international humanitarian law; a good working knowledge of the Rome Statute establishing the International Criminal Court; an appreciation of how the Rome Statute relates to national law; an understanding of world events which gave rise to the conceptualization of war crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide; a good understanding of UN Treaty Law; international conventions and the role of custom and usage in international criminal law.
